Gradient of Interventions

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· Parent education

Parent can integrate, but needs new information.

Short-term counseling

Parent can integrate and has information, but needs another perspective and dialogue around the perspective

Parent-child intervention

Parent can use explicit information to describe problems, including their own contribution, but cannot integrate discrepant information.

Adult psychotherapy (personal, not parenting)

Parent's behavior is generated implicitly, i.e., not consciously, and is maladaptive, sometimes dangerously so.

Parent needs understanding of implicit 'triggers', verbalization, recognition of discrepancy, integration, plus the experience of being understood empathically before they can understand others (for example, their children) empathically. Parent is not yet ready for parenting interventions.
